LEGISLATIVE UPDATE



Federal

You may have seen a tweet or two about the Affordable Care Act (a.k.a. ACA) being declared “invalid” by Judge O’Connor of Texas. You then may have seen multiple tweets from folks like Seema Verma, CMS Administrator, and other department heads of the Department of Health and Human Services stating the ACA would remain in effect until the appeal process—and eventual Supreme Court ruling—occurs.

Timothy S. Jost, my all-time favorite explainer of laws and court cases, did a fantastic job of [summarizing](#) what happened and what could potentially happen. I’m going to defer to the experts and just point you to that summary. The Colorado Legislature convened on January 4th. Two bills on creating a public option are expected to be introduced on the 4th. Since I’m writing this on the 4th, I don’t yet know if that is true.
